Crowds brave storm to attend EXPO 2018

The second annual Linking Hands EXPO and Maple Ridge Family Fun Day saw close to 300 people brave the snowy weather. This year's EXPO was a two-day event with a special Sensory Sensitivity Day booked for the afternoon of March 13, followed by a larger scale full-on fun zone full-day event March 14.

Bringing affordable housing to Dundas County

The Linking Hands Housing Working Group has introduced Dundas County to a new affordable rental housing model, Places for People, which the group hopes to see operational in the very near future.

The group hosted two back-to-back information sessions June 11 and June 12, one in each of the county's two townships, to showcase the model, which is currently being used successfully in Haliburton County. Fay Martin, vice-president of the Haliburton initiative, presented at both sessions.

What makes this model stand out is the personal investment made by both the tenant and the landlord. In addition to providing safe, affordable housing, Places for People partners each tenant with a mentor who assists the tenant in reaching his/her self-directed goals, small or large. And, Places for People puts 5% of the rent into a trust account for the tenant.

Eastern Ontario Health Unit news update

"The Eastern Ontario Health Unit (EOHU)'s Winchester, Alexandria, Rockland and Hawkesbury offices have changed their physical structure as a cost saving measure to ensure services and programming are maintained and enhanced while undergoing fiscal pressures.

These physical downsizes will not decrease the level of local services offered, which will, in fact, be increased.

The newly mandated 2018 Ontario Public Health standards have added components of mental health, bullying, sleep and concussion awareness/prevention, as well as an increase in responsibility relat-

ed to electronic cigarettes, naloxone distribution and opioid crisis monitoring. These programs, along with the Patients First legislation and cannabis legalization will certainly increase our presence and service offerings in the community.

Hence, our operational structure is being transformed into a mobile, flexible workforce to optimize our services and programs to the population that we collectively serve throughout all areas of the five counties.

Social Determinants of Health: The Canadian Facts by Juha Mikkonen and Dennis Raphael is a 63-page public health primer every Canadian should read.

The primer is available for download via it's official website, thecanadianfacts.org, which states that:

"The primary factors that shape the health of Ca-

nadians are not medical treatments or lifestyle choices, but rather the living conditions they experience. These conditions have come to be known as the social determinants of health. This information—based

on decades of research and hundreds of studies in Canada and elsewhere—is unfamiliar to most Canadians.

Canadians are largely unaware that our health is shaped by how income and wealth is distributed, whether or not we are employed and, if so, the working conditions we experience. Our

health is also determined by the health and social services we receive, and our ability to obtain quality education, food and housing, among other factors." Social Determinants of Health: the Canadian Facts

Check out UNICEF's 'One Youth' campaign

One in five children live in poverty in SD&SG

"In the lead up to Canada's first federal Poverty Reduction Strategy, Campaign 2000 reveals a disturbing picture of the magnitude of child poverty in every federal riding."

Campaign 2000's data shows this area—Stormont, Dundas, and South Glengarry—at 19.9% child poverty. That means 1 in every 5 children is living in poverty.

This may seem surprising, as rural poverty, like rural homelessness, is often hidden and not easily recognizable. It is evidenced, however, by the growing need for food banks, school breakfast and lunch programs, and thrift store options.

In Dundas County, we have people of all ages living in poverty, including

children and seniors.

At Linking Hands, we believe any amount of poverty higher than zero is too much, regardless of age.

What can we do? House of Lazarus was instrumental in creating an SDG Poverty Reduction Strategy several years ago. Currently, however; there is no Poverty Reduction Strategy specific to either the Township of North Dundas or the Municipality of South Dundas.
